

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

CELEBRATING 130 YEARS OF THE WYOMING FIRE DEPARTMENT....

Founded in 1893, the Wyoming Fire Department has been lead by only 14 different Chiefs. In this 130th anniversary year, we honor the chiefs and all those who have served in the WFD and the cadets who carry on the tradition. Learn a little about our second chief, Henry A. Hills,

Henry A. Hills

Wyoming Fire Chief 1894-1902 Chief Hills, better known in later years as "Captain" Hills, a mark of distinction reserved in Association circles for former Chiefs, was one of the first Fire Department consultants on record. In 1876, he contracted to organize and equip the Salvage Corps in Atlanta and Nashville, Tennessee and earlier had consulted on the organization of the Cairo, Egypt Fire Department. Born June 7, 1838, in Boston,



Massachusetts, he began to run with the "Masheens" at 16 and at 18 became a full-fledged firefighter with Niagara Engine No. 3 of Cambridge. In 1868, he moved to Rome, Georgia to enter business with his brother where he organized Citizens Hook and Ladder No. 1 of which he became foreman. Elected Chief in 1872, he served for six years. During this period, he became Superintendent of Water Supply for the city.

In 1878, he moved to Dallas, Texas to take charge of the Water Department and while there became President of East Dallas Steam Engine Company No. 2.

In 1883, he moved to Wyoming, Ohio to become Live Stock Clerk of the CCC & L Railway with offices in Cincinnati. This was reported to have been a lucrative position. At the same time, he helped organized the Wyoming Volunteers Fire Department and became its second Chief.

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George Benson Fox Civil War Letters

Wyoming is much greater than a nice area to live. Our history creates a 'sense of place,' contributing to Wyoming's enduring community and linking generations in building its history past, present and future.

Recently completed is the digitization and copying of almost 80 letters written during the Civil War by George Benson Fox from 1861 to 1863, mostly back home to his mother and father – Lockland industrialist Thomas Fox. Post-war, George Benson Fox would serve as the first Treasurer of the Village of Wyoming and later in the Ohio General Assembly. These letters are historically significant not only because of the battlefields from which they were written, but due to their fullness and detail describing this tumultuous time in American history.

Having stumbled upon a reference to this collection of letters online, I reached out to the Cincinnati Museum Center to see how one might read and view these letters. The museum archivist indicated I'd have to make an appointment as they'd have to transfer the collection from one library to a special viewing area in another. At this moment, the thought came to mind that this would be quite a bit easier if the collection was digitally accessible online.

Digitizing vast amounts of content and collections is difficult due to the time it takes and the associated cost. In working on another history related project for Miami University and Oxford, I learned of the W.E. Smith Family Charitable Trust that provides grants to local history projects relating to Southwest Ohio. W.E. Smith (former history professor and chair at Miami) was known to have had an affinity for personal letters, diaries, and journals capturing history first-hand from those who witnessed it. In applying for the grant funds for the Miami project, I went ahead and submitted an application for funds to digitize and copy this George Benson Fox Civil War collection for the Wyoming Historical Society.

This collection of letters will be added to the Cincinnati Public Library online digital archives where it will be accessible to anyone across the globe in research, projects, and preservation of Civil War history. It was built in 1909 as a Fire House. Since then is has served as home for the Police Department and later housed a variety of offices. 
400 Wyoming Avenue in 1958.



When remodeling a building you discover all kinds of things. This is the bottom half of the narrow door that led to the tower of 400 Wyoming, where the Fire Department entered the tower to hang the hoses to dry after a fire. Today the tower carries electric and cable and those things that a 114 year old building wasn't constructed to handle.

BELIEVE IT

Gunsight Pass, Hell Roarin' Gulch, Ten Sleep, Bear Track and Rabbit Hash are real places of early American Settlement. Each suggests a unique story from the past. Knockemstiff, Ohio qualified as one of those places. Its name came from a rough, no-nonsense tavern-keeper who often threatened to knock anyone stiff if they gave her any trouble. Old maps of Ross County show this small community at the junction of Black run and Shady Glen Roads near Bainville. Today the tavern is closed and the landmark sign is gone, but thanks to old maps and to historians this place and story live on.



Your Wyoming Historical Society recently received this small Fire Department badge from John Sears. It belonged to his father. We have yet to determine exactly when this little badge, 1 3/8 inches tall, was used.


Go-Basket..... Amy Pursley

Samuel Withrow had been working as a traveling salesman when he applied for a patent for a new type of "perambulator". More commonly known today as a baby stroller, Samuel's idea was to use only two wheels on the stroller and make it convertible into a baby carrier. Samuel's brother, Stanley, founded the Withrow Manufacturing Company in 1902 to mass produce this novel product. The invention came to be known as the "Oriole Go-Basket".

In 1909, Samuel left the firm to become the superintendent of Cincinnati's Anti-Tuberculosis League. Stanley remained president of the firm and obtained two of his own patents for improvements to his brother's original design. The first improvement was to add a reclining seat for the child. The second improvement was for a more traditional four-wheel baby stroller, but with retractable wheels for carrying purposes. Also, because the "basket" portion of the baby carrier device was made from rattan, the manufacturing company branched out into making rattan furniture.

Stanley sold the company in 1924 to pursue a career in real estate. Stanley Withrow and his family lived at 34 Walnut Street in Wyoming from 1904 until 1920.
