# Dr. Eric Jackson Cincinnati's Underground Railroad

While the Ohio River was a symbol of freedom and equality for thousands of enslaved black Americans, it was also used to transport slaves down the river to the Deep South. Dr. Eric R. Jackson, is co-author of Cincinnati's Underground Railroad (Arcadia Publishing, Inc., 2014), and will discuss the people and places that formed Cincinnati's involvement in the underground railroad.

A Professor of History, and Associate Dean in the College of Arts and Sciences at Northern Kentucky University, Dr. Jackson has almost thirty years of academic experience at the university level and has taught numerous classes in the fields of American and African American History, Race Relations and Peace Studies. He has published a wide array of books, book reviews and articles in local, regional, national and international journals.





degree then worked in the HVAC field until retirement.



Beth is active with many organizations in the community. Currently she sits on the Board for Wyoming JWC, volunteers with Wyoming PSA and has volunteered with





#### WILMUTH HOUSES...



#### THE PORTRAITS...

A description of the portraits on the following page as described by Historical Society board member Graydon SIkes: "A pair of half length "American School" portraits, of Mr. & Mrs. John Wesley Pfaff. Each fourth quarter 19th century, oval form, and house in period gilt and gesso frames. Each oil on canvas. Unsigned, and likey executed by an itinerant regional artist."



# MEET THE PFAFFS



John Wesley Pfaff (1849-1912) and his wife Sarah Elizabeth Abbey Pfaff (1851-1939) were long time Wyoming residents in the late 1800s and early 1900s. John was a Mason and served 16 years on Wyoming City Council. He owned the Pfaff Varnish and Stain Company. This company was started by his father, John P. Pfaff, in 1840 as the Great Western Varnish Company. It was located in the 1600 block of Central Avenue in downtown Cincinnati, near Findlay Street. He took the train from the Lockland-Wyoming Station (now Crescent Park) to work each day. Two years after his death in 1912, the company was sold and the name changed to Perry - Derrick Varnish Company.

The Pfaff Family occupied several homes in Wyoming. The 1880 census finds the Pfaff family (mom, dad and 4 young daughters) living at 41 Burns Avenue. John P. Pfaff, in 1877, had bought lot 38 – now known as 224 Wilmuth. He passed away that same year and left his property to heirs. In 1882, John W. purchased lot 37, 216 Wilmuth, from Thomas Fox. Fox was a founder of the Fox and Friend Paper Company. Fox's house still stands at 505 West Wyoming Avenue in Lockland.

In 1887, the house at 224 Wilmuth was built. With 4 growing girls, the family quickly outgrew that structure and in 1890 they built 216 on lot 37, next door. A house the family would occupy for 86 years, until the 1960's.

Their three younger daughters Louise '94, Estelle Frances '97 & Mary '96 all graduated from Wyoming High School. The eldest daughter, Pearl, married Clarence Evans, President of the Evans Iron and Steel company in 1896. According to the Kentucky Post article about the marriage "Miss Pfaff is considered to be one of the most beautiful and accomplished young ladies in Wyoming." Pearl was a member of the Presbyterian Church, sewing robes for their choir,

#### THEIR CHINA WEDDING.

Mr. and Mrs. John W. Pfaff, of Wyoming, celebrated the twentieth anniversary of their marriage at their residence last evening. Over two hundred guests were present, many going from the city and suburbs. Mr. and Mrs. Pfaff were the recipients of many beautiful presents in china. The house was artistically decorated with plants and flowers, and an orchestra on the staircase discoursed sweet music. The refreshments were delightfully served. Mr. and Mrs. Pfaff were assisted in receiving their guests by their daughters, Misses Pearl, Mamie, Lou and Stella, all bright and attractive girls fast budding into womanhood.

The third daughter, Mary J. Pfaff (1878-1967), married John Charles Ely Jr. and had three children. The other two daughters never married. Louisa "Lulu" Pfaff (1876-1958) was probably the best known as she was for many years the social editor of all things Wyoming for the *Millcreek Valley News*.

The youngest, Estelle (Stella) Frances (1879-1958) taught a business course at Lockland High School for over 30 years.

After Mary became a widow and Pearl was divorced, all four daughters and grandchildren ended up living back at home at 216 with their widowed mother. The girls were friends with Clare Barney Fisk, (Mrs. Fisk) who lived on what is now the Stearns Woods property. The family is buried at Spring Grove Cemetery.

# Clarence F. Evans to Carry Miss Pearl Pfaff Off to the Kentucky Highlands.

Clarence F. Evans, President of the Evans Iron and Steel Company, will wed Miss Peari Pfaff, daughter of John W. Pfaff, the varnish manufacturer, of Cincinnati, on the evening of Oct. 21, at the residence of the bride's parents, on Wilmuth Avenue, Wyoming. Rev. John Leroy Taylor. paster of the Presbyterian Church, will perform the ceremony. Mr. Evans is one of the rising young business men of Cincinnati, and Miss Pfaff is conceded to be one of the most beautiful and accomplished young ladies A short wedding trip in Wyoming. will be made, after which they will occupy a residence in the Highlands back of Newport. The house will be furnished complete, ready for occupancy on their return from the trip.

#### WHEN THE WALLS SPEAK .... JOE HORNSBY, CURRENT OWNER OF 209

Looking back on the last few years can stir emotions in all of us. For me personally, I'm certain this arbitrary tie to George Benson Fox will forever draw personal context to a variety of challenges in a rather volatile season of life. And so, a 'typical' house renovation takes on new meaning adding to an already appreciated 'sense of place' here in Wyoming.

The Striker Family lived at 209 Worthington Ave. since 1970 and graciously wrote a brief history of the three previous residents in the home's 150 year history, inspiring the desire to discover additional information about Maj. George Benson Fox – and what a great time it's been getting to know people like Sherry Sheffield of WHS, Christine Engels of CMC, and others who've been helpful to these efforts. With a renovation project on the horizon, one could only imagine what treasures could be hiding within the walls awaiting discovery.

Most surprising was a small bronze plaque in a basement cabinet haphazardly wrapped in brown paper and coated in decades of dust - the Wyoming Historical Society plaque from the Historic District designation in the mid-1980's; its proud Wyoming emblem and etched 1872 birthday presumably never gracing the front facade as are many displayed today. Some cleaning and polishing of the plaque has it looking as good as new, ready after 40 years to finally breathe fresh air on the front porch. Much gratitude to Jenni McCauley's leading efforts and time in designating our Historic District.

As the kitchen ceiling came down, an aged envelope to 'Mrs. Benson Fox' saw the light of day for the first time in 132 years! Inside, a perfectly preserved invitation to:


AN EASTER MARKET TO BE HELD BY THE LADIES' AID SOCIETY OF THE

WAYNE AVE M.E. CHURCH

At the residence of Mr. G. G. (George Gideon) Palmer on Burns Avenue Friday, March 27, 1891, from 2 to 5 There will be for sale, Flowers, Candies, Choice Edibles, Fancy and Plain Sewing

To imagine 13 decades passing since this invitation was received and somehow slipped into the floor above where it rested for 132 years is rather humbling. The more modern Wyoming connection is that in the 1950's church elders of what was the Wayne Ave Methodist-Episcopal Church in Lockland decided to move their congregation to Springfield Pike in Wyoming, becoming Friendship United Methodist Church. Subsequently also falling out of a nearby wall, was a Nov. 1, 1900 antique billhead from "E.F. Gates - Hartwell" likely to have been for retrofitting the home's first indoor sanitary plumbing and water – a distinct luxury of the times; and now the perfect framed display piece for above the commode! Discovering the story of what's been here all along has kept us going through an arduous project. The opportunity of adding our personal story to this history is the most exciting part of all! While all of this adds to Wyoming's character, charm, and 'sense of place', no amount of history can ever beat the sense

of place created here every day among our neighbors – our unique street communities, community in education, and all the things bringing us together contributing to an unmatched quality of life. For us especially, our years living on East Mills Ave. have been wonderful because of our neighbors. As true as this is in today's Wyoming, I garner a strong sense this was as well the story 150 years ago.




Plumbing receipt from 1900.
